Project Summary: I traveled to Mae Sot, Thailand, on the border with Myanmar (Burma,) to volunteer at a school serving Karen refugees. I am a 5th grade language arts teacher.

The army in Myanmar has been conducting a campaign of ethnic cleansing against the Karen people for over 20 years. Large numbers have fled into Thailand to escape rape, murder, land mines, and the destruction of villages and crops. Estimates range from 300,000 up to a million people, who are dependent on NGOs (non-government organizations) for food aid, education, and medical care. I volunteered at a school that serves about 160 refugee children in grades PK-4th. The children receive instruction in English, as well as Karen, Burmese and Thai. I traveled with a team of seven other people. We furnished a school library with shelves we purchased in the area, and books we carried in our luggage from home. We painted and furnished a teacher's lounge with seating and storage space for each teacher. I co-led a teacher training session on how to use the new books, and modeled interactive, engaging ways of teaching English. I traveled from classroom to classroom teaching English lessons with the children. We hosted all the Karen teachers at a local restaurant, a rare treat for them, since the teachers are refugees themselves, and live on a very low salary. I was able to interact with teachers and parents and even conduct formal interviews with a translator. I documented my experience with journalng, iphotographs, and video to use for my persuasive writing unit when I returned home.

Career Impact: *Experienced first-hand the challenge of serving, communicating, and teaching in a different culture and language *Observed the challenges faced by refugee teachers serving their students in extraordinarily difficult circumstances

- *Established contact with a Karen refugee community here in Houston *Increased understanding of the challenges faced by refugees seeking to assimilate into U.S. culture in my own city

Classroom/Community Impact:*Enhanced my students' understanding of world geography by sharing my photographs and videos
